3.3 Action Items from Previous Meetings

Action Item August 2019:

DIRDC Community Engagement Protocol – DIRDC still has not responded to August 15th request by CCC Secretariat for copy of DIRDC's Community Engagement Protocol. Chris SU repeated request end of July 2020; referred to new DITCRD officer for resolution.

Action Item July 2020:

Chris SU advises that the last submissions to the 2020 JSCEM NT electoral inquiry from the SOCI, UCIW and Poon Saan Club have been received by the JSCEM and are published online.

Chris SU advises that the legislation to keep two House of Representative Seats in the NT has been presented to Parliament that fortnight.

Action Item August 2020:

CCC notice in The Islander of 7th August 2020, issue 716 published the resolution adopted at the August 5th meeting to ask the Commonwealth to convene a public meeting on CI in relation to the items around COVID management raised at the August 5th meeting.

Gordon THOMSON provided that no update or response has yet been received from the Commonwealth in regard to this.

Action Item August 2020:

Pensioner Airfare letter to Minister being finalised to be sent.

4 Agenda Business

4.1 Territory Controller Update 29.7.2020 Presented

CCC were emailed the TC updated for 26.8.20, the latest available by meeting date.

Chris SU noted that the Emergency Management Committee have advised the Community recently that IOT residents need not present for Day 11 COVID testing and subsequent quarantine as of a Facebook update from the Administrator 28th August 2020.

Chris SU notes that the WA Govt application of the Day 11 COVID testing protocol was signed August 11th by the WA Police Commissioner and had been the standing procedure until that point. A seeming gap existed between August 11th and 28th August at the EMC level of this Day 11 requirement until it was raised to them by the Shire CEO in his capacity as EMC member on 26th August.

Gordon THOMSON reported that the Shire CEO objected to the EMC having a monthly meeting schedule now; it was weekly, then moved to fortnightly and as of Sept 1 moved to a monthly schedule. Noted that the EMC Executive Committee is not meeting at all. Noted the Emergency Declaration ends on 30th September.

4.2 IOTHS Health 5 Year Strategic Plan 2020-2025

Minister has released the 5 Year Strategic Plan document on 1st September 2020. Copy provided to CCC members.

4.3 IOTHS Health Services – Dental Services

Gordon THOMSON reported to the meeting that a review of Dental Services was underway at IOTHS at present; the Dental Therapist position may or may not be reduced or removed entirely. CCC noted the ABF August FAQ that an additional 200-300 staff would be present on the island; CCC acknowledged this would place additional usage of all island services and facilities, including the dental clinic. CCC maintains that dental services should be maintained at its current state which provided in the CCC's view an adequate level of care built up as a response of previous campaigns and initiatives for dental care on the island.

The Community Consultative Committee is aware of the current review of the dental services and staffing at IOTHS. Any proposal to reduce staffing or services will be vigorously resisted by the community organisations of the Community Consultative Committee members.

4.4 IOTHS Health Services - PATS feedback

Chris SU reported to the meeting that the telehealth policy in the current December 2019 PATS policy is being followed for a medical event he is concerned with.

The telehealth policy is that, if the mainland specialist agrees that telehealth would be an acceptable way of conducting treatment then IOTHS will not be paying for PATS flights for the patient or their carer.

Chris SU advised members to circulate to their membership that this may be a trend for healthcare for residents as more and more specialists became telehealth ready due to COVID 19.

Chris SU advised that he is funding the costs for himself and a patient to the mainland to be able to see the specialist independent of PATS assistance.

5. General Business

5.1 Territories Legislation Amendment Bill 2020

Gordon THOMSON reviews the CCC's charter and origin in respects to its duty as a community feedback mechanism into the law reform regime of 1992 that brought WA laws into effect on the island.

Gordon THOMSON presented a letter from Claire Howlett, Assistant Secretary of the Indian Ocean Territories Division of the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications dated August 20th to the Shire CEO advising him of a proposed '*Territories Legislation Amendment Bill.*' This Bill proposes some changes to the Local Government Act 1995 (WA)(CI) which currently applies. It is unclear from the letter what these changes actually are. The CEO has asked Claire Howlett to provide the Explanatory Memorandum Notes and Draft Legislation for viewing.



Dated

1. Reserve Purpose

The Reserve is to be used for the purpose of "Cultural, Recreation, Entertainment and Community Purposes and for purposes ancillary or beneficial to that purpose" only.

2. Power to Lease or Sublease or Licence subject to conditions

Pursuant to section 46(3)(a) of the LAA (WA) (CI), the Management Body is granted the power to grant a lease or licence or consent to a sublease over any part of the Reserve, for a purpose that is consistent with the designated reserve purpose, for a term (including any option term) that is not to exceed in total 21 years subject to the prior approval in writing of the Minister under, and in compliance with, section 18 of the LAA (WA) (CI).

3. Conditions

- 3.1 The Management Body is responsible for all costs associated with any repairs, maintenance and removal of all improvements on the reserve.
- 3.2 The Management Body must allocate and use any premium, rental, fees, charges or other income it receives from all leases, subleases and licences in respect of the Reserve or any part of it (Reserve Funds) to maintain and repair all buildings and structures and to maintain the grounds and facilities of the Reserve and where there are surplus Reserve Funds other reserves within the locality and otherwise to satisfy its obligations and liabilities as management body of the Reserve.
- 3.3 The Management Body must provide to the Department within three (3) months of a request of the Minister, a report that details the amount and source of the Reserve Funds received and what the Reserve Funds have been expended on during that preceding financial year, and other periods as requested.
- 3.4 Any surplus of the Reserve Funds remaining at the end of each financial year shall be paid into a trust fund established by the Management Body pursuant to section 6.9(1) of the Local Government Act 1995 or set aside by the Management Body and carried forward for future capital or major works required to the Reserve and other reserves within the locality. The Management Body shall include in the report(s) referred to in clause 3.2 above, details of any expenditure from the trust fund or from funds which have been carried forward by the Management Body and used for capital or major works to or on the Reserve and other reserves within the locality.
- 3.5 The Management Body is responsible for all improvements on the reserve that currently exist as well as those installed by or on behalf of the Management Body, including any parties subject to a lease or licence agreement. With the exception of improvements related to the provision of public services and the existing fuel pipes.

4. Definitions

In this Management Order the following terms have the following meaning:

Department means the department principally assisting the Minister in the administration of the LAA (WA) (CI) from time to time.

LAA means the Land Administration Act 1997 (WA) (CI)



RECOMMENDATIONS

Council endorses the side shade option to be installed at the Gaze Road Recreational Area to provide afternoon shade cover to the Bowls, Volleyball and Skate park areas and for an overhead shade structure over the playground equipment.

The CEO is requested to bring to the November 2020 Ordinary Meeting of Council the proposed costing of installing the shade options.

BACKGROUND

The September 2020 Ordinary Meeting of Council in considering the Settlement Cinema final Masterplan September 2020, passed the following resolution.

"The Shire Council adopts the Settlement Cinema final Masterplan September 2020.

Council also requests the CEO to look into the feasibility and costs of providing shade equipment over the skate, volleyball, bowls and exercise equipment areas, and to report back to the October Council meeting."

COMMENT

A row of trees on the western side of the recreation area will be planted, that over a period of time will provide natural shade in that area from about 2pm in the afternoon. The actual locations of those trees are shown on attachment 10.1.3.3.

While the trees over a period of time will provide a natural shad effect, the question of immediate shade options fall within 2 options, direct cover over the area, and side cover options.

In looking at the bowls, volleyball and skate park areas the overhead option coverage provided is explained in Attachment 10.1.3.1 chart No 1.

That option provides adequate shade cover between the 10.30am to 1.30pm and reducing coverage either side of that time period, which is effected by the necessity for the shade cover to be over 4 meters high to ensure it does not block the light from the 4 meter high solar lights that provides night lighting in those areas.

The second option being a 4 meter high side covers on the western side of the recreation area this would provide the shade cover as outlined in attachment 10.1.3.2 Chart 2.

In consideration of the shade options there also needs to be a consideration or the possible use or the recreational area with the daylight hours between 6am to 6pm.

Given that during Monday to Friday normally with school and work activities it is more likely the area would be used more from about 3pm, with possible a degree of midday usage occurring during weekends.

The side shade provided in Chart 2 would provide the maximum cover during possible weekday usage and equal to if not slightly more against Chart 1 over the weekends.

The construction of overhead shade cover would be a higher construction and maintenance cost as against the side cover option. The side cover option would be remover as the trees planted on the western side mature to provide natural coverage.




RECOMMENDATION

The report is noted.

BACKGROUND

Policy and legislation require regular reports to Council about the extent of debt to the Shire and any actions to be taken or to recover unpaid monies.

A debt is defined as any amount of money owed to the Shire by virtue of the provision of services, levying of rates, fees and charges, funding agreements, the provision of private works or other fee for service and payment has not been made within 45 days of issuance of invoice, notice or agreement. A debt does not include instalment arrangements, unless the final instalment is overdue by 45 days or more.

COMMENT

As at 30 September 2020, the Shire was owed \$972,540. The breakdown of monies owed is as follows:

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Section 6.13 of the Local Government Act 1995 (WA) (CI) and regulations 19A & 19B of the LG Financial Management Regulations apply. In relation to rates and service charge debts in excess of 3 years, Council must make at least 1 attempt to recover unpaid monies by court action before exercising the power to compulsory sell the property.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

Council's FI – 5 Debt Recovery Policy applies. The policy sets out the scheme for pursuing debts via letters of demand and local court action. The CEO has delegated authority to pursue debt recovery and to write off debts under \$200. Council has the sole authority to write off debts over \$200.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are some costs to Council in pursuing debts, eg summons. However, Council can also apply interest penalties on outstanding debts and court fees, thereby mitigating these costs.

STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS & MILESTONES

Objective 1 of the Governance environment is to "Provide good governance in line with the requirements of the LGA and the culture of the Island. Objective 4 of the same environment is to "effectively manage the resources of the Shire in line with the objectives of the strategic plan.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Shire submit feedback to the Commonwealth and WA Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (WA Fisheries) after examining the CI Draft Fisheries Ordinance 2020 and collecting feedback from residents using our community consultation policy and mechanisms.

BACKGROUND

The Commonwealth and WA Fisheries released a draft CI Fisheries Ordinance in August 2019 for a period of two weeks for public comment. It was met with great dissatisfaction and generated two petitions on the matter that were both sent to the Minister and WA Fisheries.

A public meeting at the Malay Club on November 11th 2019 with WA Fisheries and the Commonwealth in attendance recorded criticisms, feedback and suggestions for improvement.

A subsequent petition was created tabling the suggested 'CI Local Fisheries Management Authority' to the Minister and sent to the Minister by the Shire in February 2020.

On October 9th 2020, the new version of the CI Fisheries Ordinance was released.

It is exactly the same as the first version; only the dates have been changed.

COMMENT

GRPG Manager notes that the Minister's 9th October media release did not include any public meeting schedule or a specific contact point for queries and feedback.

The 2019 and 2020 versions of the legislation are exactly the same, only the dates have changed.

The consultation, feedback collected and suggestions received seemed not have impacted the drafting of the legislation at all.

There are no statutory environment implications under the Local Government Act WA 1995 arising from this matter.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no significant policy implications arising from this matter.

5 Zone 5: Christmas Island

The Territory

Christmas Island Fisheries Ordinances - The More Things Change, The More They Stay The Same

The Commonwealth this month returned to the Island with a new 2020 version of the *Christmas Island Draft Fisheries Ordinance* after taking in feedback from Islanders on its deeply unpopular 2019 version.

The Islander reports that this 2020 version is <u>the exact same</u> as the 2019 version, with only the dates having been changed.

Nothing else has been altered.

The 2019 Draft Christmas Island Fisheries Ordinance

The Commonwealth along with the WA Dept of Primary Industries and Regional Development (WA Fisheries) proposed a draft Fisheries Ordinance in August 2019 on Christmas Island that was met with great opposition.

It was met with great opposition on three fronts;

- Islanders felt that there was insufficient community consultation before these draft laws were released.
- 2. Islanders only had two weeks to consider these laws which would impact the Island forevermore.
- 3. It was released mid-August without any public meetings to inform residents of the proposed changes or their rationale by WA Fisheries or the Commonwealth.

Islanders were troubled by this development and raised a protest petition to object to the proposed laws.

This protest petition was received by the Shire at its August Ordinary Council Meeting who resolved to send it to the Fisheries and the Commonwealth by the 31st August deadline given by the Commonwealth.

Malay Club Public Meeting, November 11th 2019

The Commonwealth brought in the Dept. of Fisheries personnel after the deadline take in comments from the community at a public meeting at the Malay Club in November 2019. Around 80 persons attended. Attendees raised their feedback and concerns for the first time in person with officers from the Commonwealth and the Department of Fisheries, with Administrator Natasha Griggs in attendance.

Concerns were many, expanding on more than the initial three fronts earlier raised. The Island community voiced their views directly to the officers of the two government agencies. Notes were taken by the agencies at the meeting as well as by residents on the items in the draft that Islanders had issue with and made suggestions to change.

Assurances were given by the Department that the information gathered 'will go back and be taken into account and you will get a chance to see the next iteration (of the ordinance).'

A Proposed Islander Solution, February 2020

185 persons signed a second petition that proposed a solution to the fisheries matter. It was generated by the Shire in consultation with island residents and took in suggestions from the Malay Club meeting for bringing the responsibility of fisheries on island instead of the mainland. This petition was delivered to Minister Marino in February of this year.

The petition proposed to create a local Christmas Island Fish Resources Management Authority that would be populated by Islanders and Marine Scientists and Government officials of the Minister's choosing to steward the fisheries resources on the Island. This Authority would take the place of the WA Dept. of Fisheries in forming rules about fish catches, applicable restrictions and all other matters to do with fisheries management on the Island. With the advice of appointed Marine Scientists and Government officials, this body would take the responsibility off mainland bureaucrats and onto the Island.

This proposal for an Authority received no support in Canberra.

The 2020 version

The new version is exactly the same as the 2019 version. The only thing changed is the date.

It seems the feedback from the Petitions and 90minute dialogue with residents at the Malay Club did not alter what the Government intended to put out.

Assistant Minister Marino released a media release on 9th October 2020 'IOT Fishing Rules Available for Information' (reprinted on page 3-4) advising residents that 'Australian Government officials will be on CKI and CI to answer questions and provide advice and clarification around the new fishing rules, and I encourage community members to reach out to your local officials if you have any questions or wish to discuss.'

Residents are advised in the media release that they have until October 23rd to provide feedback.

While the notice did not specify who the Australian Government officials on island are, the representative of the Commonwealth on Christmas Island is the Administrator contactable at the IOTA office.

The Islander has not received any material from the Administrator, Commonwealth or Fisheries WA advising if there is to be a community consultation session within the two week deadline as of publishing.

The more things change, the more they stay the same.

IOT fishing rules available for information

Thank you to everybody who has contributed to the development of new fishing rules for the Indian Ocean Territories (IOT).

It is critical that the fishing rules provide sustainable local fisheries for current and future generations, while also recognising the unique cultural needs of your island communities.

The revised rules are now available here for Cocos (Keeling) Islands (https://www.regional.gov.au/territories/Cocos_Keeling/fishing-rules/) and here for Christmas Island (https://www.regional.gov.au/territories/Christmas/fishing-rules/) and you can ask your questions or give feedback for the next two weeks.

The wide range of community feedback has resulted in the following changes:

- The Cocos (Keeling) Islands (CKI) Cocos Malay community will be exempt from recreational bag limits for cultural or religious events.
- Designated Cocos Malay artisan fishers can sell small quantities of recreationally caught fish for community consumption.
- CKI fishers will be allowed to take a small amount (two per day) of Passionfruit Coral Trout.
- Bag limit of 40 gong gong, per person per day (bag limit will not apply for cultural or religious events) with further review in two years' time.

It is important to note the proposed new bag limit of 40 gong gong is an increase on the existing bag limit of 10 which applies in Western Australia (WA).

Based on scientific research, existing bag limits and the proposed cultural exemptions, the mixed pelagic bag limit will be four per person per day. It is a higher bag limit than allowed in WA (which is three).

The responsible approach taken by the community in recent years to fishing gong gong is making a difference and continuing in this way will be critical for the future stock levels of gong gong. Under the new rules, fishers will also be asked to record their catches in the future to contribute to important research and sustainable fishery.

The new rules would be reviewed in 2023. Over the next two years, further research of the local fisheries stock will be undertaken. This will include community input through citizen science.

I encourage you to get involved in the research, in collaboration with the Australian Government and Fisheries WA so together we can achieve sustainable fishing. You will be able to do this through Community Reference Groups (CRG). More information about these will be provided soon.

As you may be aware, the Australian Government is examining the potential for expanding research and education opportunities in the IOT. A Working Group has been established to develop a Research Prospectus for the Indian Ocean Territories (IOT) and inform a business

case for an IOT Research Centre. One objective of this work is to provide more local jobs and support the economy.

This project will also provide opportunities to expand our knowledge of IOT fisheries.

Thank you to everybody who has contributed to the development of new fishing rules. During the most recent round of public consultation, feedback was received from more than 150 residents. I am committed to continuing to work with you and to keeping you well informed as this work progresses.

Australian Government officials will be on CKI and CI to answer questions and provide advice and clarification around the new fishing rules, and I encourage community members to reach out to your local officials if you have any questions or wish to discuss.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Shire

- Seek clarification from IOTHS on the progress of placement of a permanent on-island dentist
- Does not support any plans to remove dental positions from the IOTHS dental clinic
- Ask the IOTHS to extend its IOT PATS policy to allow residents to be sent to Perth for dental examination upon recommendation of the attending IOTHS GP

BACKGROUND

There has not been a permanent dentist at IOTHS for more than 12 months. A locum dentist has been on island throughout the last year.

The locum dentist was last on island at the end of August.

There is in addition, no Dental Therapist on the island at present; hence zero dental professionals on island in October to date.

IOTHS is commencing, or soon to commence, a review into the Dental Clinic at IOTHS which includes examining staffing numbers.

The 2019 IOT PATS policy includes travel for dental needs <u>only when</u> General Anaesthetic services are required to address the dental issue. Local Anaesthetic required dental services are not eligible.

It is administratively possible for IOTHS to adopt a wider range of dental needs as one of the reasons a PATS flight is given; there is no legislative requirement to keep dentists off the IOTHS PATS policy.

COMMENT

IOTHS has not been able to deliver consistent dental services on island for the last 12 months, relying on locum dentists' availability. Residents have to arrange for their own dental examinations to the mainland on their own as

most dental needs are not covered in the current IOT PATS policy if there is no locum that particular month and the need is pressing.

Inability to acquire locums from the east coast because of border restrictions is hampering this IOTHS from being able to acquire dental services. The PATS policy should be extended to residents thus at this time for dental examinations.

IOTHS has the responsibility of oral care on Island and should facilitate access to it if it cannot provide it onsite as in the IOTHS 5 Year Strategy 2020-2025 released by the Minister 1 September 2020.

Priority 3 of the Strategy speaks to the commitment to 'a strong workforce plan' that ensures IOTHS has 'continuity of care by reducing use of nursing and medical locums.'

The IOTHS still has the responsibility of oral care; it needs to facilitate it in a manner acceptable to the community even if it can't attract a dentist to the Island at present. An extension of the Patient Assistance Travel Scheme (PATS) policy would satisfy this.

GPs are at present examining teeth; this is an extremely rare occurrence normally. GPs do not have the licensed training for extraction or dental surgery of any kind.

The 2019 IOTHS PATS policy allows for trips when dental care is needed that would require General Anaesthetic. General Anaesthetic is when the patient is placed in a state of complete unconsciousness

A dental procedure that would require a Local Anaesthetic (where the patient remains conscious and only a local numbing agent is given) such as wisdom tooth extraction, root canal treatment and gum surgery would not be eligible.

Furthermore, requiring GPs to examine patients and diagnose treatment options for dental conditions that may or may not need Genera el Anaesthesia is clearly outside the scope of usual GP practice. Dentists are trained for these oral examinations; relying on GPs is not optimal to make decisions on levels of anaesthesia needed for oral care.

2. Purpose and Objectives

The purpose of the IOTHS PATS is to assist residents of the Indian Ocean Territories (IOT) to access health related specialist and acute care services in Perth which cannot be provided on the islands. The scheme provides a financial subsidy to cover a portion of the 'out of pocket' expenses incurred when residents need to travel to access specialist services; however the scheme cannot address all circumstances or situations and is not intended to fully fund travel.

3. Scope

This policy, although based on the WA Country Health Service PATS Guidelines, affords additional provisions based on the unique nature of the IOT.

This policy is intended for residents of the Indian Ocean Territories.


4. Out of Scope

This policy does not include provisions for subsidies covered by other programs or processes that may include but are not limited to:

- Workers compensation claims
- Motor Vehicle Accidents
- Emergency medical evacuations (except for repatriation)
- Veterans Affairs

5. Overview of PATS process

Eligibility for PATS, and the nature of services supported, escorts and travel subsidies is dependent on individual circumstances. A high level process diagram below summaries the PATS eligibility requirements.



6. PATS Eligibility

6.2 Consumer eligibility for PATS

To be eligible for PATS subsidies the following requirements must be met:

- An Australian citizen, permanent resident or humanitarian visa holder (subclass 200-204)
- A resident of a Christmas Island or Cocos (Keeling) Islands (evidenced through documents such as drivers licence, electoral roll, utility bill or lease agreement)
- Hold or be eligible for a current Medicare card or a Reciprocal Health Care Agreement Medicare card
- Receiving specialist medical treatment from a medical practitioner who is registered with Medicare Australia as a specialist in a particular specialty.
- Need to travel to the mainland to receive treatment

6.3 Consumer ineligibility for PATS

PATS subsidies are not available for the following consumers:

- · Not a resident of Christmas or Cocos (Keeling) Islands
- Tourists to the islands
- · Family visitors who maintain a residence on the mainland
- · Consumers on a bridging visa
- Travelling for treatment outside Australia
- Claiming damages or other payment for the injury or illness being treated
- Claiming travel or accommodation assistance from any other organisation, such as payments from Veteran's Affairs or health fund
- Injured in a motor vehicle accident and covered by insurance
- Injured at work and covered by a work related insurance scheme, such as workers' compensation
- Fly In Fly Out (FIFO) workers
- School or university boarders on the mainland
- In custody (in jail)
- Not eligible for Medicare

7. PATS Services eligible for subsidy

7.1 Services covered by PATS

Services that are eligible for PATS subsidies include:

- All Medicare-eligible specialist medical services
- Dental services that require general anaesthetic services
- · Radiological services not available on islands (if Medicare-approved)
- Peritoneal or Haemodialysis training
- For birthing of an expectant mother during the 35th week of pregnancy

7.2 Services not covered by PATS

Services that are not eligible for PATS subsidies include:

- · Treatment that is available on islands
- Service is available by a visiting specialist (in an appropriate time frame)
- · Service is available via Telehealth
- Treatment not covered by a Medicare Benefits Schedule (MBS) item number
- · Second opinions unless requested by the treating medical specialist
- · Radiological procedures if the procedure is available on islands
- Non-specialist medical treatment, including treatment by a general practitioner
- Research and clinical trials (unless prior approval received)
- Experimental treatment
- Consultations required for legal purposes
- Consultations required for educational support services
- General dental or orthodontic services
- · Allied health and other health services including:
 - cosmetic surgery
 - o complementary health treatments, such as acupuncture or herbal therapy
 - o physiotherapy
 - o occupational therapy
 - speech pathology
 - o clinical psychology
 - o podiatry
 - dietary and nutrition services
 - respiratory therapy
 - Audiology
- Nursing services or residential care services
- Diagnostic pathology and radiology pre-appointment tests (if available locally)
- Services related to surrogacy arrangements
- Procedures that are excluded under the WA Department of Health policy, including liposuction, gender reassignment surgery, varicose vein procedures, and tattoo removal
- Services provided by a general practitioner at a skin clinic
- Medical advice consultations
- Workplace medical assessments
- Travel by ambulance
- Treatment in an emergency department, unless you have been referred by your doctor and you see a specialist in the emergency department.

8. PATS Escorts

An escort is a person who travels with a consumer to a medical appointment to assist you travel. An escort needs to be considered medically necessary by a doctor or treating specialist to be approved for the PATS subsidy.

An escort must be aged 18 years or over. An escort is responsible for transport and accommodation needs during treatment.

An escort must accompany the consumer during travel and when attending appointments, and must be able to take care of the consumer (ie. To carry bags and source meals). Only in the instance of an expectant mother may the escort travel at different times.

Only one escort will be approved when a consumer is eligible.

An escort does not need to be a resident of Christmas Island or Cocos (Keeling) Islands.

8.1 Consumer eligibility for Escorts

Criteria for approval of an escort are automatically approved under the following circumstances:

- for children under the age of 18
- if Centrelink considers the escort a principal carer (evidence required)
- an escort is deemed necessary by a doctor due to consumer cognitive, visual, physical or psychiatric impairment
- · if the consumer is undergoing chemotherapy or radiotherapy
- · if the consumer is undergoing dialysis treatment (ie. Home dialysis training)
- · if an escort is legally required to make decisions on behalf of the consumer
- if a consumer is in or past the 35th week of pregnancy (An escort for an expectant mother may travel at a different times)

8.2 Consumer ineligibility for Escorts

Escorts will not be approved according to the following criteria:

- Children under 18 years of age cannot be an approved escort
- Cultural, emotional or social comfort cannot be the main reason for an escort to accompany a consumer.
- When a clinical escort (ie. Doctor of Nurse) is required to travel with a consumer then a family escort will not be approved

9. PATS Subsidies

All claims for PATS subsidies must be made within 8 weeks of return to Christmas or Cocos (Keeling) Islands. All claims for subsidy reimbursement must include; accommodation receipts, blue form signed by a specialist, and flight boarding passes. Payment of approved claims will be made within 30 working days (six weeks) of all receipts and specialist certifications being received.

PATS support cannot extend past 6 months.

9.1 Travel Subsidies for PATS

Flights

- Consumers will be booked to fly to Perth on the closest available flight to their appointment date and will be booked on the first available flight following the completion of their appointment/treatment.
- Due to the infrequent flight schedule (bi-weekly), if a consumer would like to travel on a direct flight (ie. Not via another island) then the accommodation subsidy can only be claimed from and/or to the closest available flight to their appointment date.
- Travel dates under PATS are not flexible and cannot be extended unless there is a requirement for further treatment or medical reviews.
- The travel dates cannot be changed without the written agreement of the IOTHS. If the
 consumer does not travel on the booked flight they will be required to meet the cost of the full
 airfare. If a consumer chooses to delay their return to the islands for non-medical reasons they
 will be responsible for payment of the full airfare.
- If a consumer has 2 appointments within a 4-week period, they will be required to remain in Perth to attend the follow up appointment rather than returning to the islands between these appointments (consumers accessing chemotherapy, radiotherapy, or dialysis are exempt from this requirement).
- Birthing mothers are required to return within 4 weeks after the birth of their baby (unless specialist treatment is required).

Accommodation

Accommodation subsidies are available at the following rates:

- Private accommodation (no receipt required): \$20 per night for a patient or \$40 per night for a
 patient travelling with an approved escort.
- Commercial accommodation (receipt required): up to \$60 per night for a patient or \$75 per night for a patient travelling with an approved escort. If the escort is accompanying a patient who is to be hospitalised then the subsidy will be up to \$60 per night for the escort for the nights the patient is hospitalised.


Assistance with the cost of accommodation will only be paid for the period during which the medical specialist confirms that the patient is required to stay for treatment and follow-up. If commercial accommodation is used, the original receipts must be provided to the IOTHS when seeking reimbursement.

9.2 Travel Subsidies not covered by PATS

Travel subsidies are not available for the following;

- Meals
- parking fees
- Ambulance call out whilst on the mainland
- Taxi, bus, train or other transportation fares (except for radiation therapy, chemotherapy or dialysis)
- Costs associated with appointments (Medicare gap fees, private consultation fees)

11. Appeals

All information provided will be verified or clarified before claims are approved or not approved.

Where a claim is not approved the consumer will be provided with an explanation of why the claim has not been supported, as well as an opportunity to seek a review of the claim by the IOTHS Health Services Manager.


Reviews will be conducted through a fair, impartial and transparent process and claims will be assessed within 10 working days of all information being submitted.

Complaints and requests for review will be dealt with promptly and consumers will be advised of the outcome in writing, as well as verbally if this is needed.



Introduction

The Australian Government, through the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, funds and operates the Indian Ocean Territories Health (IOT) Service. A range of services are offered from facilities on Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands, including:

- · primary healthcare, pathology, radiology, pharmacy and acute in-patient care
- public, community and child health programs
- aged care, including home and community care
- disability services
- accident and emergency care, patient assisted travel and emergency medical evacuation
- · oral healthcare, and
- access to specialist medical care and allied healthcare.

These services are supplemented through a Service Delivery Arrangement with the Western Australian Department of Health, which provides for:

- regulatory, policy, governance and specialist medical advice
- in-hospital services and care in Western Australia, and
- mammography screening and assessment services through BreastScreen WA.





PRIORITY TWO

CARING FOR OUR SENIORS

We will provide high quality care to our seniors which responds to their changing needs, including in-home services, respite care and palliative care. Our aged care strategy will meet the different needs of our seniors on Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands.

We will

- ✓ continually monitor advances in aged care to ensure best-practice in our support
- work with the families of our seniors to deliver the care that is needed at a particular time, recognising the needs of seniors will change over time
- respect and value the needs of our seniors, their culture and their connection to the community
- provide patient focused palliative care, including for patients with dementia.

- developing an aged care strategy which considers the need for dedicated aged care and respite facilities, and increased in-home care
- clearly communicating services available, eligibility criteria for services, arrangements for funding and supporting policies
- working individually with patients, their families and their carers to deliver a tailored care program
- utilising 'My Aged Care' to mirror in-home aged care services provided on the mainland, and provide targeted training and support to nurses and health workers
- working with local organisations, the Shire of Christmas Island, and the Shire of the Cocos (Keeling) Islands to deliver recreational and cultural and activities, and improve transport services
- reviewing the program of visiting specialists annually to confirm it is adequately meeting the needs of our seniors
- providing targeted training to health care workers to ensure they can meet the changing needs of our seniors as part of our strategy to recruit, train and retain a skilled workforce.

PRIORITY THREE

SKILLED PEOPLE

We will ensure our staff are highly trained, responsive and committed to providing high qualitycare to the community. Our staff are valued and take pride in their work.

We will

- recruit, develop and retain highly skilled staff, with a focus on those with experience working in remote communities
- ✓ take pride in our work and provide the best quality care to our community
- provide professional development and training opportunities for our staff, and support for their physical and mental wellbeing.

- investing in staff training and improving development pathways for clinical and support staff
- supporting student placements in clinical roles. We will work closely with the local high schools to develop work experience, school holiday and traineeship programs
- encouraging medical students and student nurses to complete a rotation on Christmas Island or the Cocos (Keeling) Islands
- ✓ ensuring continuity of care by reducing use of nursing and medical locums
- ✓ strengthening our partnership with the Western Australian Department of Health, including to explore placements for staff to build expertise and gain experience in varying medical environments
- ✓ ensuring we have a strong workforce plan
- periodically reviewing our staffing model to ensure it provides the optimal combination of emergency, in-hospital and community care.

PRIORITY FOUR

SAFETY, QUALITY AND INFRASTRUCTURE

We will provide facilities, equipment and infrastructure that are safe, meet national standards and are appropriate to provide high-quality health care. We will deliver care that is supported by robust policies, procedures and practices.

We will

Indian Ocean Territories Health Service five year Strategic Plan

I am pleased to release the Indian Ocean Territories Health Service (IOTHS) Strategic Plan for 2020-2025, following extensive community consultation.

A copy of the plan is available on the department's website at https://www.regional.gov.au/territories/publications/index.aspx#anc_iot.

The Strategic Plan sets out the goals, objectives and aspirations for the delivery of health services in the Indian Ocean Territories (IOT) for the next five years.

It outlines the IOTHS commitments to the residents of the IOT, including delivering a high quality, patient-centred, holistic health service that supports physical, mental, social, spiritual and emotional health and wellbeing.

The Strategic Plan outlines four key priorities for the IOTHS over the period from 2020-2025. These are:

- preventative health care, chronic disease and mental health
- · caring for our seniors
- skilled people
- · safety, quality and infrastructure.

IOTHS facilities include a 24-hour primary healthcare, acute and emergency services on Christmas Island and health clinics in the Cocos (Keeling) Islands.

The department commissioned PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) to enquire into, and report on, potential reforms to the IOTHS. PwC's Final Report on the Indian Ocean Health Services (PwC Report), released in March 2019, included an assessment of community health needs, analysis of health services in comparable remote communities, and strategic initiatives including options to expand aged care at the Christmas Island Hospital.

The Strategic Plan was informed by the findings of the PwC Report, and feedback from consultation with the Christmas Island and Cocos (Keeling) Islands communities, Health Advisory Groups, IOTHS staff and the Western Australian Government.

It includes developing an aged care strategy considering the need for dedicated aged care and respite facilities, and increased in-home care. The Plan also includes reviewing the program of visiting specialists annually to confirm it is meeting the changing needs of our community.

The values of the Health Service – Committed to service, Ethical, Respectful, Accountable – will continue to underpin our goal of keeping residents healthy for the whole of their lives.

The Australian Government is committed to providing high quality patient-centred health services to the IOT communities.
